Assuring high-quality, internationally recognized standards in new degree programs

The Postsecondary Education Quality Assessment Board assesses all applications for ministerial consent referred by the Minister of Training, Colleges and Universities under the *Post-Secondary Education Choice and Excellence Act, 2000*, and makes recommendations on them to the Minister.

The Act enables all organizations not empowered to offer degree programs by an Ontario statute to apply to offer programs by ministerial consent. The Board establishes and implements internationally recognized standards for the review of programs. In fulfilling its mandate, the Board helps expand the roster of high quality degree programs for Ontarians coping with an increasingly complex, information-driven economy and culture. It serves as an Ontario source of information and reflection about international academic quality assurance standards and activities.

The quality of the programs and the academic success of the students who take them are critical foundation stones for Ontario's future.

A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR AND THE ACTING DIRECTOR

Referrals to the Board and Board Recommendations

The Board had a very busy and productive year in 2007-08. We received a steady stream of application referrals from the Minister for consent to offer both undergraduate and graduate programs. These referrals included applications from one public university from outside Ontario, three private institutions, and Ontario's Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology (CAATs). In total, forty-three referrals were received: seventeen for renewals of current consents, fifteen for new programs, ten to make changes to a current consent, and one for the use of the word 'university.'

The Board made thirty-six recommendations to the Minister: seventeen for renewal of current consents, nine for new programs, nine to make changes to a current consent, and one for the use of the word 'university'.

The Board has been regularly involved in the assessment of applications for consent from the University of Ontario Institute of Technology almost since its inception. This year, with the proclamation of the section of UOIT's Act that provides the university the statutory authority to award degrees, the Board made its final recommendations on UOIT programs. UOIT was established as a university in 2002. Between that time, and the proclamation of UOIT's degree granting authority, the Board made recommendations on 85 applications from UOIT. These included 52 applications for new programs, 31 for changes to programs (for example, to add diploma to degree bridges), as well as advice on UOIT's administrative and academic policies.

The Board is proud of the Minister recognizing PEQAB's role in UOIT's development. UOIT was judged, in part, ready for unrestricted degree authority on the basis of its record of successful PEQAB reviews.

The board has also garnered recognition for assisting UOIT to provide high quality education by the institute itself. This is best summed up by the following testimonial that appeared in our 2005-06 annual report from

Dr. Donald Wallace, Associate Provost, Academic and Strategic Planning at the University of Ontario Institute of Technology: "We have had many constructive and meaningful experiences with PEQAB assessors that have contributed to the strengthening of our programs. Our exchanges with the Secretariat have been equally productive and professional. Throughout our interactions, we have accumulated overwhelming evidence that we are dealing with individuals who are committed to the principle of introducing programs of the highest quality and to safeguarding Ontario's reputation as a leader in postsecondary education."

Championing Collaboration - Promotion of Shared Standards and Procedures

In previous annual reports, we referred to the initiative started by the Board to develop a set of consistent and coherent standards at a pan-Canadian level. The purpose of this initiative was to facilitate mobility and transferability domestically, as well as to increase the understanding of Canada's postsecondary education institutions internationally.

This initiative resulted in a report that recommended a degree level qualifications framework, procedures and standards for degree program quality assessment, and procedures and standards for institutional assessment that were endorsed by all provincial ministers in April 2007.

The Board has continued to promote the concept of shared standards and procedures in the current year in a number of ways. It has entered into discussions regarding its adoption of the common set of standards for programs delivered by distance education with a number of the regional accrediting agencies within the United States. A sub-committee comprised of Board members will collaborate to update key standards in this area. The Board anticipates releasing these distance education guidelines in late summer or fall of 2008.

In the last annual report, we noted that Dr. Donald Baker, the Director of PEQAB's secretariat from its inception until October 2006, left to accept the position of Dean of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences at the United Arab Emirates University Al Ain. This has resulted in the development of close ties between the Board and various Emirates' agencies and institutions of higher education in the Emirates. In November 2007, the Council of the Colleges of Humanities and Social Sciences of the UAE University formally adopted a set of degree level standards that are based on PEQAB's standards. In addition, the Deans of the Gulf Region Universities met in Al Ain in December 2007 and discussed the adoption of these standards.

PEQAB's advice on topics such as qualification frameworks, standards for polytechnic institutes, and quality assessment standards and processes has also been sought by a number of organizations during the year. These have included: The University Council of Jamaica; Comision Nacional de Evaluacion y Acreditacion Universitaria (Argentina); Commission for Academic Accreditation (United Arab Emirates); Higher Education Evaluation Center of The Ministry of Education (China); National Authority for Quality Assurance and Accreditation in Education (Egypt); Higher Education and Training Awards Council (Ireland); and the Council on Higher Education (South Africa).

INQAAHE Conference 2007

We reported fully on the highly successful 2007 conference of the International Network of Quality Assurance Agencies, "Quality Assurance: Coming of Age - Lessons from the Past and Strategies for the Future", hosted in Toronto last year by PEQAB. In wrapping up the financial aspects of the conference, the Board is happy to report that this was the first of INQAAHE's biennial conferences that actually made a profit. The Board transferred this profit to the INQAAHE to help in meeting the costs of a number of its special initiatives. We can also report that the Board has posted two e-books containing almost all of the conference presentations and accompanying slide decks on the INQAAHE conference section of the Board's main website.

The next biennial conference, "New Approaches to Quality Assurance in the Changing World of Higher Education", is scheduled for 2009 in Abu Dhabi and the secretariat has met and been consulting with the host, the Emirates' Commission for Academic Accreditation, on a number of occasions to assist them in their planning activities.

Internal Review of the Post-secondary Education Choice and Excellence Act, 2000

In December 2006, the Minster notified the Board that he was undertaking an internal review of the *Post-secondary Education Choice and Excellence Act, 2000.* Citing the release of *Reaching Higher: The McGuinty Plan for Post-Secondary Education* and the passing into legislation of the new Private Career Colleges Act, the Minster decided that: "It is now both timely and appropriate to ensure that the PSECE Act fits properly and completely with the new, enhanced postsecondary framework for Ontario." The review is ongoing.

Continuous Improvement

The Board and the Secretariat received very positive feedback pertaining to their work in the annual survey of applicants and assessors. Based on feedback, the Board has continued to improve the PEQAB website, updated its Frequently Asked Questions, and is reviewing its three handbooks for applicants. The Board also has a number of other items specifically aimed at the continuous improvement of its activities on the agenda for the coming year.

In addressing the Board's standard on organization self-evaluation and program self-evaluation, a number of applicants and consent holders have requested that the Board provide more detailed guidance on its expectations. This is why the Board has made the development of a guide for consent holders, focused on planning and executing their self-evaluation processes, one of its major projects for the upcoming year.

To prepare a large number of consents to be renewed in 2006-07, the Board developed a special renewal handbook to be used only by the Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology. In the up-coming year, and with the benefit of having dealt with a large number applications using the special handbook, the Board will be producing its standard renewal handbook to be used by all consent holders.

Credential Recognition within and outside of Canada

As in previous years, members of the Board and the Secretariat were often asked to speak about the standards and processes of the Board and also about the principles of quality assessment in general. In this regard, our emphasis is always on the rigour of the Board's criteria, their consistency with standards recognized in Ontario and elsewhere, on the transparency and fairness of the Board's processes, and on the expertise employed by the Board in its reviews of applications for the Minister's consent. In closing, we note that three new members were appointed to the Board this year:

- Richard Pinnock, M.B.A., is the Managing Director of INROADS/Toronto, a Not-for-Profit organization that provides leadership training and summer internship opportunities for Canada's top visible minority and aboriginal university students.
- Patricia M. Rowe, Ph.D., is Professor Emeritus of Psychology and a former Dean of Graduate Studies at the University of Waterloo.
- Richard Barham, Ph.D., is Professor Emeritus of the University of Guelph where he was a former Department Chair and subsequently Dean of the College of Family and Consumer Studies.

Professors Rowe and Barham have served as auditors of undergraduate program reviews conducted through the Council of Ontario Universities, and bring a wealth of degree assessment experience to the Board.

QUALITY ASSURANCE IN THE UNITED STATES

The past couple of years have been filled with challenges for U.S. accreditation generally and regional institutional accreditation specifically. Public policy makers express reservations about the capacity of our highly decentralized quality assurance programs to respond to demands for accountability, both of colleges and universities and the agencies themselves. Our member higher education organizations expect accrediting agencies to buffer them from unwanted government intervention. Therefore, the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA) appears to be concerned that activist accreditation will jeopardize institutional autonomy. In this highly charged environment, new collaborative efforts have emerged (for example, national and regional accrediting agencies have had unprecedented discussions on several matters) while potential new rifts appear. Several national presidential organizations are spearheading voluntary accountability efforts, and seek the support of quality assurance agencies in this decentralized endeavor.

Both the reauthorization of the Higher Education Act (now four years overdue) and the confrontational positioning of the U.S. Department of Education meant that highly publicized discussions about accreditation inevitably focus on national issues and a national agenda. But in fact, several states are providing promising leadership in addressing challenges in increasing ease of student mobility among institutions and in creating common public templates for reporting institutional and student performance. State higher education leadership appears to understand and appreciate the impact of regional accreditation's pioneering work in integrating into the culture of each college and university a commitment to assess the learning achieved by students. We share goals of making higher education responsive to local as well as national needs and to using quality assurance to strengthen institutional capacity for continuous improvement.

In this shifting public policy environment, regional agencies strive to highlight the common ground they walk and at this point will turn attention to how they can jointly create and implement new strategies both to be transparent and accountable in their own activities and to support their institutions in doing the same.

QUALITY ASSURANCE IN LATIN AMERICA

Quality assurance in Latin America and the Spanish speaking Caribbean has been developing steadily since the beginning of the nineties. Currently Chile, Argentina, Colombia, Brazil, Costa Rica, Ecuador, El Salvador, Mexico, Cuba and the Dominican Republic have consolidated schemes of quality assurance for higher education. At the same time, Paraguay, Uruguay, Bolivia, Peru and Panama are in the initial stages of development of accreditation systems.

The MERCOSUR countries (Argentina, Brazil, Paraguay, Uruguay, plus Chile and Bolivia) have developed a regional accreditation mechanism which leads to the recognition of degrees granted by an accredited program, and Central America has established regional agencies in the fields of Engineering, Agricultural Studies and graduate programs, which operate in all the countries in the region.

At the national level, the operation of QA schemes has helped to develop an increasing consideration of outcomes and processes in the establishment of institutional policies and provided a needed measure of accountability regarding the use of public and private resources. Many institutions in different countries report that QA has helped them develop institutional research capacities, and provided significant insights through the feedback received from external reviewers and QA agencies.

At the international level, successful accreditation processes have led to the subscription of bilateral agreements for the automatic recognition of degrees on the basis of the national accreditation of professional programs.

The Iberoamerican Network for QA (RIACES) has contributed to the consolidation of a regional quality assurance community, and to its capacity building, through internships, exchange of external reviewers, study visits and the circulation of materials and documents. One of its current priorities is the support to the establishment of internal QA mechanisms in QA agencies, as well as to their self assessment and external review.

QUALITY ASSURANCE IN AUSTRALIA

AUQA was created in 2000 by the state and federal governments of Australia as the principal national quality assurance agency in higher education. In announcing its creation, the then Federal Minister of Education said: "We need a system that... signals to the community and the rest of the world that the quality of the higher education system is assured through a rigorous external audit of university quality assurance processes."

In 2005, AUQA commissioned an external independent review, with senior national and international figures on the panel. The panel reported positively on AUQA's performance, its achievement of its objectives and vision, and its alignment with INQAAHE's internationally-recognised and widely-used Guidelines of Good Practice for QA agencies.

"The Review Panel considered that AUQA has established a robust quality audit system that is rigorous and generally well-respected. In addition, the Panel considered that AUQA has established detailed and effective procedures for audit that include auditor appointment and training, extensive and thorough investigation, and consistent implementation. In addition, the Review Panel acknowledged that AUQA has successfully delivered a demanding audit schedule since its establishment." Supporting the review's further finding that "there was general acceptance across the higher education sector that AUQA's audits were fair and accurate and that there was reasonable acceptance of the quality of AUQA's judgements" is the positive feedback on the value of their respective audits from the great majority of vice-chancellors.

The following statement was made by a vice-chancellor this year as he submitted the report of the University's self-review for the University's second AUQA audit: "The audits conducted for Australian universities by AUQA have the potential to be invaluable – particularly in view of the [renewed] focus on outcomes. Certainly, the recommendations and commendations identified in my University's first AUQA audit report provided the impetus for a range of initiatives that have, over subsequent years, contributed to a lift in the University's performance. The data presented here evidence this improvement, and should provide the audit panel with a basis from which to advance useful suggestions for the future."

QUALITY ASSURANCE IN IRELAND

The Higher Education and Training Awards Council (HETAC) is a public body, accountable to the Irish government and the Oireachtas, which exists to benefit learners and potential learners by:

- Setting standards, accrediting programmes and awarding qualifications at all levels of higher education and training;
- Providing assurance to the public that programmes of higher education and training are above an acceptable threshold level of quality and that objective quality assurance processes are in place to meet the expectations of Irish Society and the International Community;
- Delivering a quality improvement service to accredited educational providers so as to contribute to raising standards to increasingly higher levels.

Reform and change in Quality Assurance in Ireland's higher education system has reached the stage of humdrum normality. The introduction of the Irish National Framework of Qualification in 2004 marked one of the major reforms of this decade and the years since have seen the concepts of quality assurance based on learning outcomes rather than on inputs become embedded in the thinking of faculty in higher education institutions. Inevitably this process is taking time but the support of ministry, agencies universities and students ensures the end result is clear even if some unevenness in implementation still exists. The demographic changes involved in the change from a century and a half of Irish emigration to net immigration (mainly from Eastern Europe and Asia) has provide an impetus for these reforms.

In 2007 the meeting of 46 European higher education ministers received a scorecard of HE reforms covering quality assurance, credit systems, qualifications frameworks, diploma supplements, student involvement and portability of loans and grants across national boundaries. Ireland headed this league table just beating Scotland into second position. With the completion of the external review of the Irish Universities Quality Board in the first half of 2008 all relevant Irish bodies had been reviewed under the European Standards and Guidelines (2005), the Higher Education and Training Awards Council (HETAC) having been the first body in Europe to complete a successful review under the ESG in 2006.
